Her short stories have appeared in several international publications such as The Edinburgh Review, The Ontario Review, Adrift (Ireland) as well American literary magazines as Story Quarterly, and Real Fiction. The F.A.C.T. Theatre Company will present Penny's first full-length play, *Booze In The Boroughs*, at Joria Main Stage in May 2011. Her short plays and monologues have appeared this year at the n.u.f.a.n. Ensemble in Chicago, Black Coffee Productions in New York, The Playwrights Roundtable in Orlando, Florida, as well as F.A.C.T. theatre in New York City. Her play, Bitten, was recently chosen to be included in the Playwright's Symposium at The Mid-American Theatre Conference in Minneapolis, Minnesota in March.

Renee Cyr (Director, *The Belle of Staten Island*) is a recent transplant to Seattle and very excited to be directing her first piece "in the real world." She is originally from VT and recently completed her undergraduate degree from Muhlenberg College in Allentown, PA where she majored in theatre (directing and performance studies) and minored in philosophy and religion. In June she moved here to work as a teaching intern at Taproot Theatre. After falling in love with Seattle she decided to move here permanently to pursue her career as a director and teaching artist. Renee wants to thank her family for all of their love and support.

Margie Slovan (Director, Landis and the Bear and woman:revised)

A former actor, Margie left the theater for journalism fifteen years ago but recently discovered a passion for directing that was impossible to ignore. Now she divides her time between film, theater and video. She recently directed Neil Simon's play *London Suite* and worked as script supervisor on *Nothing Against Life*, an independent feature film which was shot in Seattle. A native New Yorker, Margie is a proud graduate of the High School of Music & Art, the American Musical and Dramatic Academy and Seattle's The FilmSchool.

Catherine Berg (Playwright, Landis and the Bear) received an MFA in Fiction from the Iowa Writer's Workshop and has written two unpublished novels. Her plays have received readings at the Circle Repertory Company, Wisconsin Public Radio, the Omaha Magic Theatre, the Shandaken Theatrical Society, and the Woodstock Fringe Festival. She lives with her partner in Kingston, NY, 100 miles up the Hudson River from NYC. She's thrilled that Landis and the Bear is being produced at Stone Soup.

Freddie Brinster (**Festival Adjudicator, Week One**) In reverse chronological order: theatre critic *for Bellevue Journal American* (until 1998); MA in theatre UW; active member Snohomish County Community Theatre.

Kirby Lindsay (Festival Adjudicator, Week One) lives, works and plays in the Fremont neighborhood. She met her late husband, Leonardo "Harpo" Lindsay, while she operated Ladybug (used) Books, and wrote about Fremont for *The Seattle Press*. After his passing, she moved to Colima, Mexico for three years. After her return, she wrote about the Center of the Universe again, first for *the North Seattle Herald-Outlook*, and now on the neighborhood news website Fremocentrist.com

Nancy Worssam (Festival Adjudicator, Week Two) From teaching anthropology at Quinnipiac University in Hamden, Connecticut, to working with prospective grantees at the National Endowment for the Humanities, mine has been an eclectic career. Add to that mix serving as program director at the Lincoln Park Zoo in Chicago and as strategic planner for The Chicago Botanic Gardens and the picture becomes even more complex. All of these career moves involved writing, but it is only in Seattle where writing has become my main occupation. At last! Finally! I am now seriously pursuing the kind of writing I really want to do. Many of my reviews of theatre productions and art exhibits can be found in the Seattle Times, even more are on my blog artsstage-seattlerage. I've also edited an anthology of 41 essays by women who speak eloquently about the present issues and past experiences of women of a certain age. Called *In Our Prime*, it's available on Amazon.com.

Katherine Luck (Festival Adjudicator, Week Two) is an award-winning playwright, short story author, and journalist. Her work has appeared in publications across the U.S. including Crosscut, Seattle Woman Magazine, Farmhouse Magazine, The Amistad, Oregon Literary Review and Northwest Baby & Child. She is co-editor of the Journal Newspapers, which serves communities in the Seattle metro area and beyond, and is editor of Pacific NW Theatre online. Her plays have appeared on stages around the Pacific Northwest including Portland Repertory Theatre, the Multicultural Theatre Consortium of Portland, Do North Theatre, the Erickson Theatre and the Phoenix Theatre. She has a Bachelor's degree in Theatre Arts from the University of Oregon and is a member of the Society of Professional Journalists, Dramatists Guild of America and the American Theatre Critics Association.

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Samantha Sherman (Dir, *Operation Sweet Dreams & The Synopsis*) has rediscovered her passion for theatre and is finally returning to directing after 17 years of self-denial. Suzanne Bailie (Playwright, *Operation Sweet Dreams*) has a Master's Degree in Education and frequently uses her writing skills to build interest in subjects and creatively engage her students. She is an active member of the Dramatist Guild, Seattle Playwrights Studio and The Seattle Arsonist playwrights. The Bill and Peggy Hunt Playwrights Festival at the Burien Little Theatre will feature her one act science fiction play, Two, this April. As director, her work has been seen at New City, The Group Theatre, Empty Space, local festivals, and particularly with Seattle Playwrights Alliance, where she directed staged readings and workshops. As producer, she created the first US Fringe Festival (Seattle) and New Waves, the Playwrights' Radio Show. She was Artistic Associate at both The Group and Empty Space Theaters.
